
Focus on partnership between WCDH and Urban League/SEP

CHIP/Surveys/Community Conversations

- Promote Well Being and Prevent Mental and Substance Use Disorders.
- Prevent opioid and other substance misuse and deaths.
- Prevent opioid overdose and deaths through Naloxone training and community-based prevention education.
- Prevent opioid overdose and deaths by increasing the number of fentanyl test strips distributed.
- Develop a plan and distribute Naloxboxes to community locations in high risk areas.

Westchester County

- Westchester County is located just north of New York City, with a population of just over 1 million people, as of the 2020 U.S. Census Bureau.
- It is bordered on the west by the Hudson River, on the north by Putnam County, and on the east by the Long Island Sound and Connecticut's Fairfield County.
- 48 municipalities, predominately a mix of urban and suburban communities. Comprised of six cities, 19 towns, and 23 villages, the County is home to 43 public school districts and 21 colleges and universities.


Yonkers

Sexual Health Clinic Services

- The Westchester County Department of Health provides walk-in, confidential, clinic services for the testing, treatment and prevention of STIs.
- Pre-Exposure prophylaxis to prevent acquiring HIV infection (PrEP) is also available.
- Examination, laboratory tests, treatment and vaccines.
- Rapid tests for HIV and Hepatitis C virus are available with results given to at the visit.
- Referrals by SEP.

Syringe Exchange Program

- Only SEP in Westchester County
- Provides sterile syringes and educates individuals who are at risk at contracting and/or transmission of AIDS/HIV and/or other sexually transmitted diseases
- Offer referrals to services and substance abuse treatment, etc.
- Offer Narcan trainings
- Overdose aftercare counseling provided and overdose prevention strategies discussed with all clients.
- WCDH has had staff conducting HIV testing






New York Matters

- Medication for Addiction Treatment and Electronic Referrals
- Electronic platform to refer people with
 Opioid Use Disorder to treatment settings
- Hospitals, correctional facilities, law enforcement, inpatient facilities
- Patients can also be referred to telemedicine
- 4 hospitals, 16 clinics, 9 pharmacies











NY Matters Mission & Goal

- To provide every person multiple pathways to treatment and resources within their own community by improving access and eliminating barriers.
- Utilized across the United States as a way to reduce morbidity and mortality rates for people by linking them to stigma-free treatment and resources.



ORI Task Force

- The Opioid Response Initiative (ORI) Task Force meets monthly and brings together key stakeholders from across Westchester WCDH and WCDCMH co-chair
- Includes representatives from the Westchester County Departments of: Health, Community Mental Health, Social Services, Public Safety, Medical Examiner's Office, Westchester County District Attorney's Office, local law enforcement, and community partners such as Urban League of Westchester



ORI Task Force

Works to:

- Increase access to harm reduction and substance use prevention services
- Identify communities most in need of overdose support services
- Execute more effective education, training and distribution of Naloxone
- Conduct more thorough data collection, analysis and transparency relating to overdoses
- Increase community education, outreach and support services to populations in need
- Find and implement evidence-based treatment approaches for individuals who are also struggling with co-occurring mental health needs

Harm Reduction Groups/Xylazine

- ► Facilitates group at the Syringe Exchange Program
- Both staff from Urban League and WCDH
- Xylazine
 - More individuals are experiencing xylazine use
 - Wound care and basic knowledge to recognize a wound that requires care
 - Increase in distribution of xylazine test strips
 - More counseling on the effects (hospitalization, amputation, etc.)



ULSEP Overdose Data Collection

- Staff collects data from clients to get a better understanding of "when" and "where" overdoses occur (home, park, train, car, etc.).
- Clients are generally open to disclose this information.
- This data also helps staff during outreach activities to target specific neighborhoods and communities to provide overdose prevention education and materials/supplies.

Overdose Aftercare Counseling

- Staff provides counseling to individual(s) that have administered Narcan and/or the individual that received the Narcan about the incident and if/how it affected them.
- At times, the individual that administered the Narcan can be a family member or friend and may need additional support to better understand what their loved one is going through.
- Aftercare counseling is also offered to couples if they prefer to discuss their substance use openly.

Sex Workers

- Health Services
- Sexual Health Education
- Safe sex kits (flavored condoms, flavored lubricants, dental dams, female condoms, etc.)
- Referrals for testing (HIV, STI, Hepatitis C)
- Referrals for medical care, if needed
- Self Care
 - Individual counseling
 - Self empowerment
 - Hygiene (hygiene kits shampoo, conditioner, soap, lotion, deodorant, toothpaste/toothbrush, mouthwash, comb, brush, lip balm, hand sanitizer, antiseptic wipes)
 - Clothing, if needed (hats and gloves in the colder months)
- Additional Needs
 - Water (small bottles are easier to carry)
 - Snacks (chewy granola bars are easier to eat)
 - Reusable water bottles (water and snacks are important when they are outside for long hours so that they remain hydrated)
- Provide a reusable tote to carry their belongings


Ushers

- Ushers and Deacons are "first responders" in an emergency
- Not all ushers are open minded to harm reduction or overdose prevention
- Ushers often sit in last row can have kit readily available
- If they don't want it visible, there are options (kits placed under pew)
- Churches often have events to attract more people (Friends and Family Day, Homecoming, Church Anniversary, Pastor's Anniversary, Holidays, etc.)
- Food pantries are open to the general public and can attract large crowds, some which may be at risk of an overdose
- Food pantry staff can be trained to respond to an overdose

Lives Forward

- Department of Corrections and Department of Community Mental Health
- Westchester County Hosts Graduation Ceremony to Recognize Ten Students in Unique "Lives "Forward" Program
- Ten Students completed the first stage of newly developed program
- Individuals with addiction, mental health and criminal justice background while they reside in the County Jail
- ► The certifications are overseen through two state agencies
- ► The NYS Office of Mental Health (OHM) certifying "Peer Specialists"
- The Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) certifying "Certified Recovery Peer Advocates (CRPAs)
- Training was provided by Mental Health Empowerment Project (MHEP), based in Mount Vernon and the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence/Westchester, Inc.

Lives Forward

- Westchester County will work to ensure the dually-academic trained peers, upon return to the community, are connected with potential employers, anticipating expeditious employment as para professionals
- Along with helping incarcerated individuals get on a better life path, this program also helps fill a shortage of much needed trained para-professionals for mental health and addiction.
- Collaboration between County, State and local agencies



COSOC Community Roundtable

- Early Spring 2024 event
- the harris project is dedicated to addressing prevention, treatment, recovery, and system transformation for individuals with, or at risk of developing, co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (COD).
- CODA (Co-Occurring Disorders Awareness) Curriculum Pilot in Westchester County: Supported by an Opioid Response (ORI) grant from Westchester County, and in collaboration with the Partnership to End Addiction, the harris project is developing and piloting a COD curriculum in seven Westchester County school districts, with additional curricula for adult supports.
- Pace University is doing an evaluation and feasibility study as part of the pilot.
- Award-Winning PSA "You Don't Know The Half Of It": This public service announcement aims to raise awareness about the realities and challenges of living with co-occurring disorders. Bronx-Westchester Area Health Education Center



- Bronx-Westchester Area Health Education Center (BW AHEC) is a community-based organization that provides health-career, education, exploration, and experience for high school, undergraduate, and graduate students. Students are given internship opportunities in medically underserved areas to learn about issues surrounding health equity.
- The Opioid Prevention Education Project (OPEP) is an initiative where we deliver education about opioids to youth in high school and college as well as community members. This project consists of information about opioids, education on the science of addiction, and informing students about harm reduction resources in their community.

Trauma-Informed Initiative

- > WCDH aims to foster a work environment that acknowledges the potential for trauma and implements measures to prevent it.
- WCDH acknowledges that prioritizing the mental health and overall well-being of its staff is a fundamental aspect of cultivating a trauma-informed workplace.
- WCDH is committed to becoming trauma-responsive and fostering trauma-informed organizational change.
- More than 200 WCDH staff members participate quarterly 2-hour live sessions on Trauma-Informed Care (TIC).
- The sessions outline WCDH's commitment to aligning departmental and divisional cultures, policies, decisions, strategies, and practices with the principles of a traumainformed care approach.

FINDINGS

ACEs are pervasive! 64 percent of 17K study participants had one of the ten ACEs; 16 percent had 4 or more ACEs.

Unmistakable links between ACEs and adult onset of chronic disease, mental illness, violence and being a victim of violence, work issues.

ACEs contribute to most of our national problems, including chronic disease, substance abuse, violence and financial and social health problems.

One type of ACE is not more damaging than another! Statistical outcomes remain the same regardless of adversities experienced.

↑ ACE Score = ↑ Negative Outcomes

An ACE Score of 4+

DOUBLES risk of heart disease and cancer

700% increased risk for alcoholism

1200% increased risk for suicide attempts

Males with an ACE Score of 6, when compared to males with an ACE Score of 0, has a 46-fold (4,600%) increase in the risk of becoming an injection drug user.

Different races and ethnicities do not experience ACEs equally! Nationally, 1 IN 3 black non-Hispanic children have experienced two to eight ACEs, compared to only 1 IN 5 white non-Hispanic children.

Mount Vernon Youth Bureau

- Mount Vernon Youth Bureau was awarded a grant to provide overdose education, tobacco prevention and vaping education within the community.
- The Urban League actively works with the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau and the City of Mount Vernon to provide opioid overdose prevention education to teachers, security guards, school personnel, after school staff and community residents.
