
St. Lawrence County is located in Northern New York along the Canadian border. There are 32 towns, 10 villages, and 1 city within St. Lawrence County's borders.

Approximately 535 square miles is farmland, which equates to almost 20% of the county land.

There are 4 colleges in St. Lawrence County.

The estimated number of CYSHCN in the county is 5,523.

5th largest county east of the Mississippi River







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
