NEW REPORT | KFF Health News Investigates National Opioid Settlement Funding

KFF Health News released a two-part investigation on how states and localities spent nearly \$2.7 billion in opioid settlement funds in 2024. The review of more than 10,500 spending decisions found that funds largely supported treatment, overdose-reversal medications, recovery services, and housing, though some dollars were also used for law-enforcement equipment and community events.

UPDATED REPORT | LAPPA Drug Checking Equipment, Needles/Syringes, and Drug Paraphernalia: Summary of State Laws

In 2022, the Legislative Analysis and Public Policy Association (LAPPA) conducted a comprehensive review of drug paraphernalia laws across all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and U.S. territories to examine how these laws apply to drug checking equipment and syringes. This September 2025 report serves as an updated version of that original analysis, reflecting developments since its initial release.

Comprehensive Medicolegal Death Investigation Training:
Scene Investigation and Overdose Recognition

This new comprehensive training program presented in partnership with the **New York State Department of Health** and **Syracuse University** is designed to enhance the knowledge and

skills of **coroners and medicolegal professionals** in the fundamentals of scene investigation, including the recognition and reporting of overdose deaths. Participants will benefit from interactive instruction, hands-on learning, and collaborative discussions with subject matter experts in death investigation, toxicology, and public health, while networking with colleagues from across New York State. This 30-hour course is divided into two components: an online module and an in-person session.

Adult Children of Parental Addiction: Trauma and Healing | January 7 at 12:00PM | [Register Here!](#)

Adult Children of Parental Addiction (ACAs) were young children of parental addiction who have not received healing, so the developmental trauma effects last through the lifespan. Presentations are specific due to trauma and chronic stress from chaos, abuse, neglect, violence, uncertainty, and relationship dysfunction. Survival roles and defenses can be passed down intergenerationally. Childhood safety skills can appear as confounding adult behaviors affecting relationships, such as traumatic bonding, emotional constriction, cycles of re-enactment, and unresolved grief. Effects are further complicated in families with poverty, racism, incarceration, gender bias, and other forms of discrimination. This is a quietly marginalized and invisibly stigmatized population. Identifying resiliencies and accessing strengths offers a new perspective on self and a solid foundation to build from in the healing process.

This webinar moves beyond the "why" and focuses on the "how." We will equip you with tangible skills for assessment, alliance-building, and integrated treatment to effectively serve LGBTQ+ clients, recognizing that their substance use is often a symptom of deeper, stress-related challenges.

Funding Opportunities

REMINDER: NACCHO Reimagining Health and Public Safety Overdose Initiatives (RHAPSODI) Projects | Applications due January 5 at 5:00PM EST

With support from CDC, NACCHO is offering a funding opportunity to strengthen overdose prevention efforts at the intersection of public health and public safety through the Overdose Response Strategy (ORS), a collaboration with ONDCP's HIDTA Program. Funded projects should focus on preventing overdose among people at high risk—particularly those involved with the criminal legal system—by implementing public health–driven approaches within public safety or overdose response settings.

Programs are expected to reduce overdose risk, limit unnecessary criminal legal system contact, clarify appropriate roles for public health and public safety partners, and engage community-based organizations and people with lived experience to inform project design and delivery. NACCHO will fund up to 15 projects through Planning Awards (up to \$50,000) and Implementation Awards (up to \$120,000), with technical assistance from NACCHO, CDC, and local ORS teams.
